

Friends of the Dunedin Botanic Garden

Annual Report

August 2018

This report outlines the Friends of the Dunedin Botanic Garden's achievements from August 2017 to July 2018.

Being new to both Dunedin and to the Botanic Garden it has been wonderful getting to know them both and appreciating what is undoubtedly the most popular visitor attraction of this city although, sadly, seriously underresourced.

Education

Botanic gardens the world over are invaluable in raising awareness of plant conservation issues and the importance of species diversity. They kindle an interest in plants as well as potentially teaching children where food comes from, or fostering a love of nature and the natural environment.

A priority for the committee this past year has been to seek funding to reinstate an Education Officer for the Garden. A dedicated, full-time teacher would enable the Garden to provide a rich, hands-on, sensory learning experience for thousands of local school students, approximately 3,300 are within walking distance. An education programme would inspire curiosity and fascination and encourage scientific inquiry about the world's plants. The Dunedin Botanic Garden is an ideal environment to learn about plant identification and increase awareness and appreciation of plants and why our lives depend on them

We have been seeking funding for a full time equivalent education position but, to date, two funding bodies have turned us down while a submission to the Dunedin City Council 10 year plan also failed to secure any funding.

Scholarship

Early in the year the committee agreed that the proceeds from the Rhododendron Plant Sale would be used to launch the David Tannock Scholarship to assist with professional development for the Garden staff. The first recipient of the award is collection curator Dylan Norfield who will be heading to Tasmania to explore possible seed exchange and other reciprocal opportunities with the Royal Tasmanian Botanical Gardens.

Membership

The committee devoted some time this year to considering ways to boost membership, deciding a simplification of categories and reduction in fees was an option to be trialled and is being presented here today for members consideration - we welcome your feedback.

During these discussions committee members were





reminded by Mick Reece of a unique membership incentive worth repeating here. As a member you can submit a request for a plant you've seen growing in the Garden and, within reason, the propagation staff will endeavour to grow it for you.

The loss of the newsletter compiler and an outdated website meant that communication with our members had been scant. It was a priority to reinstate a newsletter as soon as possible and both paper and email versions now exist. The website has had a considerable makeover and now meets members expectation of the ability to pay their subscriptions online.

The Friends are now affiliate members of the Australian

Association of Friends of Botanic Gardens, a link to their newsletter - *Eucalypt*, will be posted on our website for our members to enjoy. The Friends are also now members of the Kindred Group.


Information Centre



Looking Ahead

Early in the year the Curator, Alan Matchett presented the committee with plans to develop the Upper Garden. The committee saw many advantages and educational opportunities to the Demonstration Garden and agreed to commit \$50,000 to the project. Happily, The Dunedin Amenities Society could also see the community engagement potential and have pledged \$20,000.

With no additional funding granted to the Garden in the council's 10 Year Plan, the Friends have a busy time ahead making funding submssions to support the development and maintenance of the Garden. Our list includes items we submitted to the 10 year plan process:

- Additional funding for the Demonstration Garden.
- Educational programmes to be prepared and delivered at the Garden for schools (and other community learning groups).
- Maintenance and renewal of high use built assets such as the Tea Kiosk and Information Centre.
- Renewal and restoration of heritage and operational assets including Tannock's House, upper garden staff and workshop building, aviary and lower garden bandstand.
- Completion of the works at the new propagation facility on Lovelock Avenue.
- Improvement of the public facilities in the upper garden for parking, toilets and manoeuvrering of coaches.
- Improvement of the parking for buses (and also cars) in the lower garden area as the public parking on roads adjacent to the BG becomes increasingly under pressure and the demand for tour buses parking increases with each year.

The committee thank you, our members and Alan Matchett and his team for their support during the year.
